He worked hard all day as a farmer, but even so he didn't always have enough to provide for his family and certainly didn't have any surplus to invest in his farm.

That all changed the day he received a cow at a Christmas gift distribution event. In just a few months, the cow gave birth, supplying a calf and milk for the family. The calf provided extra help for Pratul to plow his fields, and he used the cow dung as fertilizer. As the years went by, the cow gave birth to three more calves! Through the additional sources of income from his herd, Pratul's family had plenty of food to eat and his five children were able to finish school.

And the best part of this report is that Pratul and his family received not only physical blessings from the gift, but spiritual life as well. He is eager to share with others how much God has blessed him and taken care of his family, and many others have come to know of God's love because of this family's testimony.

IT Teamwork

Last year at GFA we had a strong focus on development projects, most of which involved the "Enterprise Applications" half of IT: Jonathan, LaMott, Rob, and Rebecca. He has a sharp mind that keeps the vision for the project clearly in view while at the same time tackling complicated technical issues and making wise decisions.
