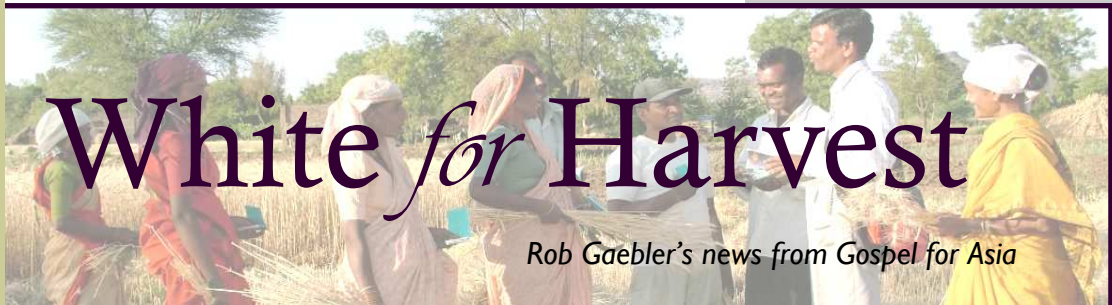


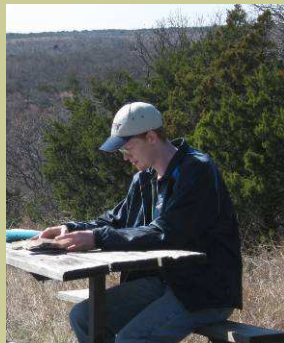

In March I went camping for a personal prayer retreat. It was a good time of refocusing on the Lord and being refreshed.

My dear friends,

Recently I contemplated this question: Why do I serve the Lord? Why do I give everything to reach the lost? My answer is simple: *Because Christ is worthy!*

There is a famous story

about two young Moravian missionar-

ies who sold themselves into slavery, never to return, in order to take the Gospel to the slaves on some island. As their boat pulled away from their weeping families on the shore, one of the young men cried out, "May the Lamb that was slain receive the reward of His suffering!" Christ's reward is the souls of men and women who are now lost in darkness but who will come to know Him through our witness. This saying became the call of Moravian missions.

How can I talk about my "sacrifice" when I think about Jesus pouring out His blood for me on the Cross? David Livingstone, who endured great hardship and suffered great loss to take the Gospel forward in Africa, said, "I never made a sacrifice." The Lord is indeed worthy of all I have to give!

I recently heard a story that put things in perspective. Some of my friends went to India in January, and a national missionary they met, "Kumar," told them about an encounter he had with a woman. It brought tears to my eyes when I heard it.

The story is about an Indian woman who had no peace in her life; her soul was deeply burdened. In her desperation, she went to her Hindu priest. This woman asked the priest how she could find the peace she was so earnestly seeking. Imagine her

heartbreak when the priest told her that in order to find inner peace, she had to make a great sacrifice.

The woman took her two young children and waded out into the river, until it was too deep for them to stand. Then she let go. As the river carried them away, they cried out, "Mommy, mommy, save us!" She watched them float away around the corner, then she returned, weeping, to the shore. Our missionary Kumar met her there and found out what she had just done. Then he shared the Gospel with this woman, about God's love for her and how she could only find peace and forgiveness of sins through Jesus. She had never heard of Jesus before.

I wish I could tell you that this woman's story was the exception. But the reality is that over 2 billion people alive today don't know our Savior's name, and many of them are just as desperate to find forgiveness of their sins.

Right now, a Hindu festival called the Kumbh Mela is taking place in Haridwar, India. An estimated 60 million Hindu devotees have made their way to the banks of the Ganges River over the last three months. There, they wade into the filthy brown waters to

"cleanse" themselves of their

sins.

"Hundreds and thousands of people daily come here believing their sins will be washed away by bathing in the Ganges," writes GFA's correspondent in the area. "Please pray that they would know the real Savior who has the power to wash away their sins."
